1996: THE OLYMPIC GAMES IN ATLANTA

A few weeks before the Opening Ceremony of the 26th modern Olympic Games, Billy Payne and Andrew Young, the two men who had brought these Games to Atlanta, met in the 85,000 seat Olympic Stadium. "Look how beautiful it is," said Billy. "When we started building it in 1993, I doubted whether we would be able to finish all these buildings in time." They sat down on a bench somewhat exhausted but very happy and their minds went back to the days when they had competed with Athens and other cities for these Olympic Games.

In the early morning of September 18th, 1990, thousands of people wandered nervously around Underground Atlanta - an entertainment and shopping centre. They stopped frequently to stare at one of the two giant television screens specially set up

for the occasion. The programme on the screen was from Tokyo. At last J.A. Samaranch, president of the International Olympic Committee (IOC), stepped up to the microphone. The crowd held its breath. "The IOC has given the 1996 Olympic Games to the city of - Atlanta." The excited shouts of the crowd shook the TV screens. Cannons shot confetti into the air, balloons and fireworks filled the sky. But soon afterwards the hangover started with hundreds of critical headlines such as: "Money Planners Worry About Who Will Pay" - "So Much To Do In Only 6 Years."

The organizers had to raise \$1.38 billion to build all the facilities for the Games. Billy and Andrew remained optimistic: "The Games will bring in \$1.52 billion, providing a comfortable surplus for the city. A third of this sum will come from worldwide television rights, a third from licenses on coins and other products, and the rest from sponsorships, ticket sales and various other sources. We won't need the taxpayers' money."

And then the work started. Apart from all the Olympic sites, the city had to repair streets, improve bridges, clean up slum areas, so that the tourists would get a good impression of Atlanta. A private group called 'Trees Atlanta' was founded and they planted \$5 million worth of trees, mostly using their own money.

It was getting dark outside the stadium and the huge mascot near the entrance was illuminated. "Look at Izzy!", said Billy. "Sometimes I still call it 'Whatizit', as it was called first because I don't know what it is. I can't help it. I still don't like this creature." But Andrew reminded him of all the money they had already earned with the help of this mascot. "The kids seem to like

35 it. They've made up fantastic stories about Izzy's identity. Apparently it's a teenager living in the Olympic Flame. Now it is waiting, just like the two of us, for more than 10,000 athletes accompanied by at least 5,000 personnel. It reigns over an area of 5 km in diameter in the heart of Atlanta, where seventeen of the Olympic sports will take place."

"Come on, Andrew," said Billy, "you're either getting romantic or you've seen too many commercials. I think we'd better go home now."
